Memo: Refreshing the Climate Change Interdepartmental Executive Board's monitoring and reporting function

To Climate Change Chief Executives Board

Purpose

- This paper seeks the Board's agreement to a refresh of how the Climate Change
 Interdepartmental Executive Board Unit (CCIEB Unit) monitors and reports on progress
 towards the Government's climate change goals and targets (and consequently how the Board
 reports on progress to CPMG).
- 2. The goals of the refresh are to:
 - embed an 'adaptive management' approach to meeting emissions budgets, as set out in the second emissions reduction plan (ERP);
 - enable a parallel shift, over time, to a similar 'course-correction' approach to managing adaptation risk; and
 - support the Board and CPMG with the right information at the right time to make strategic decisions that are consistent with New Zealand's climate change commitments.

Background

Emissions monitoring

- 3. With the publication of ERP2, there is an opportunity to review how the Board monitors progress, particularly in light of the annual adaptive management function Cabinet has given the Board. The ERP1 reporting approach is quite administratively intensive for both agencies and the Unit, so we need to streamline and reduce the reporting burden while still providing the information decision makers need.
- 4. Supporting this adaptive management cycle will require a shift in how the CCIEB Unit monitors and reports on implementing ERP2 and progress towards EB2. While it remains important to track the implementation and impact of ERP2's eight key policies and their sub-actions, we recommend the CCIEB Unit's future reports place a greater emphasis on the global context and the combined impact of the NZ ETS and its settings. We also need to track any significant changes to the assumptions and inputs that inform the emissions baseline.

Adaptation monitoring

- Since publishing the first National Adaptation Plan (NAP) in August 2022, the CCIEB Unit has been monitoring and reporting on the implementation of its actions. Cabinet agreed that the Board will report every two years on the overall sufficiency of the actions in addressing the most significant risks, as set out in the National Climate Change Adaptation Risk Assessment (NCCRA) [CAB-22-MIN-0287].
- 6. The Government again committed to the Board playing this role in its recent response to the Climate Change Commission's (the Commission) NAP Progress Report, including recommending course-corrective action where necessary. Fulfilling this function will require a parallel shift in approach for the CCIEB Unit's adaptation monitoring and reporting as to date reporting has focused on the status of actions and upcoming milestones.

Governance of monitoring and reporting

- 7. At its last meeting, the Board signaled its intent to be more strategically focused in 2025, requesting that most policy and operational decisions are delegated to lower levels of the governance structure, freeing up Board time to focus on the big picture, key risks and its advice to CPMG. Refreshing the CCIEB Unit's approach to monitoring and reporting will support this shift by ensuring each layer of governance has the right information at the right time to support the appropriate level of decision-making for its mandate.
- 8. At the March Board meeting we will bring a paper with proposals for resetting the approach to governance, to ensure decision making is as streamlined and efficient as possible.

Key messages

- 9. This paper seeks the Board's agreement (following Climate DCE's endorsement) for the CCIEB Unit to shift its approach to monitoring and reporting over time to one that:
 - situates the Government's climate action and progress within the wider national and international context;
 - monitors the *impact* as well as the *implementation* of the actions the Government is taking to progress emissions reduction and adaptation goals and targets, including looking at trends over time;
 - produces strategic reporting that supports a cycle of course-correction decision-making as required. This includes flagging early any current actions/strategies/plans that may need to be revisited, as well as identifying new opportunities to explore.
- 10. In the short term, we are seeking your agreement to a bespoke schedule of reporting for 2025 that begins to embed this shift, while still delivering on current reporting requirements, including:
 - closing out ERP1 reporting to the end of the first emissions budget period on 31 December 2025;
 - beginning to report on ERP2 readiness and early implementation from April 2025, ahead
 of the plan's formal start date of 1 January 2026;

- reporting once on NAP implementation progress for the year ending 30 June 2025 (following the existing reporting approach); and
- continuing to produce quarterly Target 9 progress reports, integrating these as appropriate into this wider reporting.
- 11. In the medium term, the CCIEB Unit will take the following steps to embed a regular schedule of strategic reporting from 2026:
 - develop an ERP2 monitoring framework to support the 'track, review, response' adaptive management cycle set out in Chapter 3 of ERP2 (see Appendix 1);
 - develop a set of indicators to monitor as part of this framework, covering the four indicator types (external factors, progress indicators, action delivery, and mitigation availability) set out in Chapter 3 of ERP2;
 - consider opportunities to combine monitoring of these indicators with the ongoing production of quarterly Target 9 reports, and align and integrate this reporting as appropriate;
 - procure external support to develop a parallel risk-mapping approach to support a similar cycle of course-correction for adaptation decision-making.
- 12. The CCIEB Unit will come back to the Board with specific proposals for how an adaptive management process will be undertaken and the proposed indicators to support this in May.

Design principles and success criteria

13. The CCIEB Unit has identified the following design principles and success criteria to inform a refresh of its monitoring and reporting approach, with the overarching objective of the right information, at the right time, at the right level, to support the right kinds of decisions:

Emissions reduction reporting to support adaptive management

- 14. ERP2 defines adaptive management as "actively monitoring and responding to policy delivery and changing circumstances that affect how New Zealand is tracking towards EB2." It commits the Government to progressing through three sequential stages each year (see also Appendix 1):
 - tracking policy delivery and leading indicators:
 - · reviewing projections and risks and evaluating progress against the emissions budget;
 - responding when necessary to stay on track for EB2.
- 15. Cabinet has committed to annually confirm, as part of the Government's response to the Commission's ERM report, whether the Government remains on track to meet the second emissions budget and, if not, to recommend further actions that might be necessary to get back on track [ECO-24-MIN-0243].

Statutory and/or fixed timeframes need to anchor the annual adaptive management cycle

- 16. The annual Gas (GhG) Inventory showing actual historical emissions is published each year in mid-April, covering the year ended approximately 18 months earlier, as per United Nations requirements.
- 17. The Commission's annual emissions reduction monitoring progress report (ERM report) must be published annually within three months of the GhG Inventory being published. The Government's response to the Commission's report (which the CCIEB Unit coordinates) is due within three months of the Commission's report.
- 18. In future, the official GhG projections will be updated each year in late August, for publishing in October. This means they can be used when preparing the Government's response to the Commission's ERM report and as part of the adaptive management cycle required under ERP2.
- 19. The first opportunity for the Board and CPMG to engage with this annual cycle will occur in 2025, even though ERP2 will not yet have formally come into effect. Using the annual GhG Inventory (April) and official projections update (August), the CCIEB Unit will work with agencies to provide the first annual adaptive management advice to Cabinet in October, as part of the Government's response to the Commission's next ERM report. This will include confirming whether ERP2 remains sufficient to meet EB2 ahead of the plan formally coming into effect on 1 January 2026, or whether further action is required.
- 20. From 2026 onwards, the CCIEB Unit proposes to move to a cycle of annual emissions reduction reporting, as set out in the diagram in Appendix 2.

Developing a comprehensive set of ERP2 indicators

- 21. To support the adaptive management cycle, ERP2 commits the Government to tracking and reporting on a comprehensive set of indicators, in four categories:
 - External factors metrics with a material impact on emissions but over which the Government has no influence or control

- Progress indicators metrics with a material impact on emissions over which the Government has limited or indirect influence
- Action delivery metrics to monitor whether planned Government policies are delivering as expected
- Mitigation availability metrics to monitor potential future available mitigation technologies or opportunities.
- 22. We have also heard from DPMC that the PM is looking for early leading indicators and is particularly interested in the following indictors: EV chargers and uptake, tech adoption and penetration, sector emissions, leading indicators around energy and ETS price. DPMC have also emphasised the need to track the key assumptions and inputs that have the biggest impact on the emissions baseline.
- 23. The CCIEB Unit is working with agencies on developing an ERP2 monitoring framework and will look to bring in new indicators into the target 9 reporting as soon as possible. We will present a draft framework to DCEs and the Board in May and, following DCE and Board endorsement, will begin to put processes in place to implement the adaptive management approach in the second half of 2025.
- 24. In the short term, the CCIEB Unit will also focus on identifying key measures to track the implementation status of ERP2 policies and actions during 2025, to begin reporting to the Board and CPMG on these matters from April 2025.

Adaptation reporting to monitor against risk

- 25. The Government's recent response to the CCC's first NAP progress report provides a helpful summary of the parallel shift that needs to occur in the CCIEB Unit's approach to monitoring adaptation risk and supporting a course-correction decision cycle.
- 26. As set out in that response, the Board is responsible for:
 - overseeing implementation of the NAP;
 - periodically assessing its sufficiency in addressing the most significant risks in the NCCRA;
 - giving insights on progress and advising where course corrections are needed.
- 27. Reporting on adaptation progress is more complex and will require innovative approaches as well as proxy indicators to measure progress and identify areas of risk. We are in the process of procuring external consultants to help develop options for risk mapping and other approaches to monitoring the sufficiency of the NAP in addressing risk. We will report back to DCEs with recommendations in the second half of the year.

Proposed new report format

28. The CCIEB Unit intends to begin reporting to the Board and CPMG in a new format from April 2025 onwards, to align with this refreshed approach. We anticipate there may be some iteration, and where possible, we will try to bring as much of the reporting into the Target 9 report itself, rather than having additional sections. The table below outlines how we anticipate the current report format is likely to change:

ERP1 closure report

- 29. In March 2025, the CCIEB Unit will report to the Board (not CPMG) on ERP1 implementation as at 31 December 2024. The report, and the action tracker that underpins it, will be provided to the CCC to inform their 2025 emissions reduction monitoring report. It will also inform the Government's response to the Commission's report.
- 30. ERP1 and EB1 conclude on 31 December 2025. We propose to provide an ERP1 closure report in March 2026, confirming the final status of ERP1 actions as at 31 December 2025 (and also identifying which ones are continuing in EB2, including via ERP2). This would be informed by action tracker updates for the period January to December 2025. We will look to only procure the necessary information for this reporting, so may look to further streamline/simplify the action tracker for this purpose.
- 31. We 9(2)(g)(i)

recommend that resourcing is put into reporting on EPR2 readiness instead. We will reconfirm this recommendation as part of the March 2025 report to the Board, subject to any risks identified.

Consultation

32. The recommendations in this paper were developed with Board agencies, including through an Interagency Climate Directors workshop on 5 February and endorsed by DCEs at their meeting on 19 February.

¹ The final assessment of progress against EB1 will not be available until the GHG inventory is published in April 2027.

Next steps

- 33. At the March Board meeting, the CCIEB Unit will bring a paper responding to the Board's request to review the quality assurance processes in place to support emissions modelling and projections. Having robust processes in place to support quality emissions projections, including training, audits and agreed data protocols and standards will be critical for ensuring the reporting processes and adaptive management approach set out in this memo are credible.
- 34. At the March Board meeting we will also come back with proposals for the governance of the new monitoring and reporting processes, including opportunities to streamline and improve efficiencies across the governance layers.
- 35. At the May Board meeting we will provide a more detailed proposal for the adaptive management approach and monitoring framework, including indicators.

Recommendations

- 36. We recommend that you:
 - a. Note the publication of the second emissions reduction plan (ERP2) and the Government's response to the Climate Change Commission's first National Adaptation Plan (NAP) Progress Report provide an opportunity to refresh the CCIEB Unit's approach to monitoring and reporting to support strategic, coursecorrective decision-making cycles for both emissions reduction and adaptation.
 - b. Agree the CCIEB Unit shift its approach to monitoring and reporting to one that:
 - situates the Government's climate action and progress within the wider national and international context;
 - monitors the *impact* as well as the *implementation* of the actions the Government is taking to progress emissions reduction and adaptation goals;
 - produces strategic reporting that supports a cycle of course-correction decisionmaking as required.
 - c. Agree that the CCIEB Unit will produce a bespoke schedule of reporting that:
 - continues to produce quarterly Target 9 progress reports, integrating these as appropriate into wider reporting.
 - begins to report on ERP2 implementation from April 2025, ahead of the plan's formal start date on 1 January 2026;
 - closes out ERP1 reporting via a March 2026 report, confirming the final status of ERP1 actions as at the end of the first emissions budget/ERP1 period on 31 December 2025;
 - reports annually on NAP implementation progress for the year ending 30 June;


- d. **Agree** that a final report on EPR1 be provided in March 2026 for the year ending 31 December 2025, with no report provided in October 2025.
- e. **Note** the CCIEB Unit will take the following steps to develop the new reporting approach during 2025, ready for full implementation from 2026:
 - work with relevant agencies to develop an ERP2 monitoring framework to support the 'track, review, response' adaptive management cycle set out in Chapter 3 of ERP2;
 - develop a set of indicators to monitor as part of this framework, covering the four indicator types set out in ERP2 and responding to the PM's request for particular indicators;
 - consider opportunities to align and integrate this reporting with ongoing Target 9 reporting;
 - procure external support to develop a parallel risk-mapping approach to support a similar cycle of course-correction for adaptation decision-making.
- f. Note that the CCIEB Unit will come back to the Board with specific proposals in May.



• Collectively drives improvements in risk management across the 4Rs (reduction, readiness, response & recovery), focused particularly on reducing risk and increasing national preparedness.

Interlinkages

Climate adaptation has interlinkages between both boards. New Zealand's adaptation approach has the potential to improve resilience to national risks, with reliance placed on the CCIEB to govern and oversee the Government's adaptation work programme. The NHB focus is broader, looking across national risks and the National Hazard System to identify initiatives that could have the greatest impact on improving resilience across a number of risks.

Substantive conversations on climate risk and climate resilience matters need to happen at Climate DCEs or the CCIEB, with any risks or gaps identified flagged to the NHB for review and action.
