Memo: Board work programme and climate priorities 2024 and 2025

To Climate Change Chief Executives Board

Purpose

- To facilitate discussion of and seek feedback on the three attached prompts:
 - a 'Board retrospective' covering key successes and how the Climate Change Chief Executives Board (the Board) spent its time in 2024, as well as likely focus areas for 2025 – as a starter for discussion,
 - a 'Climate milestones 2024/2025' graphic presenting 2024 achievements and likely key priorities for 2025 in a timeline format (this was included in the CPMG papers for 9 December 2024, as part of the 'looking ahead to 2025' item)
 - a forward agenda for CPMG meetings.

Background

- 2. The Chair of the Board agreed it would be useful to have a session to reflect on the Board's performance and role in 2024 and discuss priorities for 2025. This was scheduled for the December Board meeting, but due to the unavailability of Board members, it has been rescheduled for the January board meeting.
- 3. The attached A3s were endorsed by Climate DCEs on 4 December. The Climate DCEs noted the overlap in Board membership between the Natural Hazards Board and the Climate Change Chief Executives Board. They also discussed the potential shared governance role across adaptation for both Boards, and an action was taken for Climate DCEs to explore this further.

Discussion

2024 successes

- 4. The Board's time was predominately focused on the priorities it identified for 2024. Notable successes in line with these priorities include:
 - Successfully delivering the PM's quarterly Target 9 reporting.
 - Establishing CPMG and having dedicated Board time on the agenda to advise Ministers. In addition, strong levels of Ministerial engagement on ERP2 demonstrate high levels of trust from Ministers.

 Commissioning work programmes to support ongoing data improvements and ensuring an ongoing stewardship role for the data and modelling system continues into 2025.

Changing context for 2025

- 5. The Board is well positioned to understand where the climate response sits within the broader Government work programme, and to understand the competing priorities and/or opportunities for climate in 2025.
- 6. Adaptation is a priority for the Minister of Climate Change in 2025 and he may bring this lens to his new local government portfolio. The Board can support the landing of key policy choices for the adaptation framework and can also help to maintain focus on the long-term vision for adaptation, which could be overtaken by the need for immediate decisions.
- 7. With the publication of ERP2 we will transition to reporting on a new ERP, alongside embedding the Board's adaptive management role as a key part of the regular monitoring and reporting function. The CCIEB Unit has initiated a review of its monitoring and reporting function and will provide the Board with options on how to transition to the new plan in the next couple of months.
- 8. A series of interrelated and possibly complex decisions are needed to respond to two Climate Change Commission reports and the Methane target review delivered in Nov 2024 (CCC reports include recommendations for the 2050 target review and whether international aviation and shipping should be included, and recommendations for the fourth emissions budget). Considering and responding to both sets of recommendations will need to occur alongside consideration of the biogenic methane review. This may necessitate the Board to play a role to ensure advice on different aspects of the climate targets (eg methane or long-lived gases) remain coherent for Ministers.
- 9. The Climate Change Commission will also release further advice and monitoring in 2025 (including advice on ETS settings in April and the next annual emissions progress report in July). The Commission has also put out a call for evidence to support the publication of the next National Climate Change Risk Assessment. There are opportunities for external engagement with the Commission, and with other parties to support delivery of adaptation policy delivery and ERP2 implementation should the Board wish to explore this.



Subject CCIEB Unit assessment of Budget 2025 climate impacts

Background

- The Board has previously provided advice on climate Budget packages to Ministers. This
 included a Climate Emergency Response Fund investment package in Budget's 2022 and
 2023.
- 2. Under the current government, the Climate Change Interdepartmental Executive Board Unit (CCIEB Unit) supported the Treasury to assess the emissions impact of the 2023 Mini-Budget process and Budget 2024. For Budget 2024, this included preparing the 'Climate Impacts of Policy Assessment' (CIPA) disclosure for initiatives with a climate impact.

Role of the CCIEB Unit in Budget 2025 advice

- The Minister of Finance agreed that a small group of officials from the Ministry for the Environment (MfE) and the CCIEB Unit assist the Treasury to prepare and provide advice and quality assurance of climate analysis for Budget 2025.
- 4. The focus of Budget 2025 is on savings, with limited, directed new bids for spending. The Minister of Finance has agreed that the climate impacts of Budget 2025 be assessed, and information be made available to support Budget Ministers' meetings.

Outline of the approach

 The CCIEB Unit has begun work with the Treasury to assess the information received to date from agencies. This initial analysis will be updated and refined as the Budget process progresses.

- 7. The CCIEB Unit will contribute to Treasury-led advice to Budget Ministers and later to Cabinet, to ensure Ministers are informed of any impacts that savings initiatives or new spending bids may have on meeting emissions budgets.
- 8. A CIPA disclosure may be included alongside the Budget 2025 Cabinet paper should the threshold for a CIPA be met (outlined in CO (20) 3). This will involve aggregating information from agencies about the emissions impacts of initiatives included in the Budget package. Staff from the MfE CIPA team will also provide quality assurance across the climate analysis for Budget 2025.
- When assessing emissions impacts, the CCIEB Unit may identify other relevant climate change implications (such as for climate resilience) and provide additional advice to the Minister of Finance.
- 10. The Budget process will move at pace over the coming months, and the CCIEB Unit is subject to meeting timeframes set outside its control. The Treasury will provide the overall sign-out for the CIPA and climate analysis as part of the wider Budget 2025 package. As such, the CCIEB Unit will provide updates to the Chair of the Board of progress and significant advice points on behalf of the Board. As timing allows, updates will be provided at Board meetings.

Recommendations

- 11. We recommend that you:
 - a. **Note** the CCIEB Unit will work with the Treasury to advise on the climate impacts of the Budget 2025 package
 - b. **Note** that the Unit will provide updates to the Board Chair at significant advice points, and to the Board as time allows.

In closing, the Chair acknowledged the Board's contribution to navigating the various challenges over the year. The planned discussion reflecting on the Board's role over 2024 and looking ahead to 2025 has been deferred to the Board's first meeting in 2025.

The Chair expressed thanks for the Board's leadership and best wishes for the holiday period.
