- Please use your power to call in the Te Awamutu incinerator application. I do not support burning rubbish, tyres and plastics because of the huge climate impacts and toxic emissions.
 - I support a moratorium on all waste-to-energy incineration because burning mixed solid waste will not help us reduce waste or emissions. Incineration is a false solution that would take us in the wrong direction because it's just another disposal method like landfill where out of sight out of mind hides the damage.
 - I support efforts to ensure the import and production of all goods from packaging to end of life is handled in a sustainable manner.
- Please 'call-in' the resource consent application for this project it is wrong on so many fronts I am amazed that it has even been considered as an option for rubbish disposal.
