COVID-19 Recovery (Fast-track Consenting) Act 2020 – comments sought on referral application – Ariki Tahi (Sugarloaf Wharf) Upgrade

Ariki Tahi Sugarloaf Wharf Limited has applied to refer the Ariki Tahi (Sugarloaf Wharf) Upgrade project to an expert consenting panel (a panel) for consideration under the COVID-19 Recovery (Fast-track Consenting) Act 2020 (FTCA). This letter is sent to you pursuant to section 21(2) of the FTCA.

The project is described in Appendix A and a link to the application documents is in the covering email. As the project is partly within the Coastal Marine Area (CMA), the Minister of Conservation (Hon Kiritapu Allan) and I will jointly decide on the application.

Minister Allan and I invite you to provide written comments on the referral application. Comment is sought on the specific matters outlined in the table below, and on any other matter you consider relevant to our decision on whether or not to accept the application.

The above information is provided to you in confidence and as part of the statutory process set out in the FTCA. Please do not forward the application or the request for comments to anyone outside your organisation.

Specific questions on the application

- Are there any reasons that you consider it more appropriate for the project, or part of the project, to proceed through existing Resource Management Act 1991 (RMA) consenting processes rather than the processes in the FTCA?
- 2. What reports and assessments would normally be required by the council for a project of this nature in this area?
- 3. Does the applicant, or a company owned by the applicant, have any environmental regulatory compliance history in your region?

4. Are you aware of any parties with an interest in the project site which is greater than the general public?

If we decide to accept the application and the project is referred to a panel, the council will have the opportunity to nominate a local authority representative (who could be a councillor or independent hearings commissioner) to sit on the panel and determine the Resource Management Act 1991 approvals needed for the project. The applicant will provide a detailed assessment of environmental effects and cultural impact assessments at this stage and the council will have the opportunity to provide further comments to the panel. The Ministry for the Environment has prepared guidance on local authority involvement with fast-track consenting projects which you can access on the Ministry for the Environment website.

Ariki Tahi (Sugarloaf Wharf) Upgrade	Ariki Tahi Sugarloaf Wharf Limited	The Project is to upgrade the existing wharf facilities at Ariki Tahi (Sugarloaf Wharf) to separate commercial and recreational uses, cater for the projected increase in aquaculture production in the Firth of Thames, and improve resilience to extreme weather and tidal events. The project scope includes:
