The specific location of the project proposed by MTT is yet to be determined as it relates to the rebuild of the only marae of the hapū, Tangoio Marae and several papakāinga after their devastation in Cyclone Gabrielle. MTT has been mandated by the Marae Trustees and various residents of the papakāinga to engage with the Crown to explore options for the rebuild (as part of Crown's Kaupapa Māori Pathway approach established by the Cabinet Extreme Weather Recovery Committee). As part of the rebuild, new land will need to be acquired because as a result of the Crown's Category 3 classification of land in Hawke's Bay, almost all of the land owned by the Marae Trustees and the blocks occupied by the residents has been determined as unsafe for

residential use because of the intolerable risk of injury or death and very significant and regular damage to property from future flooding (which cannot be mitigated). Hence, one or more new sites needs to be identified and acquired.

The location for Marae and papakāinga rebuild will need to be within the takiwā (traditional area) of the hapū, as recognised in the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Hapū Deed of Settlement, because for the Marae and papakāinga to function for their intended purposes, the location will need to be within the takiwā which encompasses an area in northern Hawke's Bay identified from Keteketerau (the former outlet of Te Whanganui-ā-Orotu / Napier Inner Harbour) in the south, to the Waitaha River in the north and from the Maungaharuru Range in the west to the coast and beyond to Tangitū (the sea) in the east and which is identified in the attached image, using the TPK Te Kāhui Māngai mapping.

Rebuild of Tangoio Marae and Papakāinga Rebuild, Hawke's Bay

What is the project summary?

Please write your answer here:

The project proposed is a rebuild of Tangoio Marae and papakāinga which were destroyed during the 2023 Cyclone Gabrielle. The Marae was originally located in Tangoio and the papakāinga were located at Tangoio, Arapawanui and Te Waiohingānga / the Esk Valley. The Marae will service in excess of 9,000 hapū members as well as the wider community and the papakāinga will accommodate a minimum of 12 homes.

What are the project details?

Please write your answer here:

After the destruction of Tangoio marae, the only marae in the takiwā of the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Hapū, papakāinga and other taonga, the aim of the project is to rebuild the marae and papakāinga in areas which are safe for these activities as the sites these are currently located on have been classified by the Crown as Category 3 and unsafe for residential use because of the intolerable risk of injury or death and very significant and regular damage to property from future flooding (which cannot be mitigated).

The rebuild is vital to the recovery of the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Hapū from the Cyclone and its objectives are to ensure that:
(a) displaced whānau can be relocated from areas where there is an unacceptable risk of flooding and risk to life, to warm, safe and dry homes in a papakāinga on suitable land within the takiwā.

(b) the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Hapū (estimated to be in excess of over 9,000 members, of which 6,500 members are already registered with Maungaharuru-Tangitū Trust) can again have a Marae on suitable land within the takiwā to undertake cultural activities and practices. This includes learning (wānanga and a separate kōhanga reo), discussing and debating tribal matters, celebrations (āhureka), funerals (tangihanga) and practising tikanga. It is a place for the Hapū to stand and belong and without it, the Hapū are left without a place of refuge and place to celebrate their cultural identity.

Describe the staging of the project, including the nature and timing of the staging

As the exact location of the site/s is not currently identified, timing and staging cannot be committed to. However, an estimate of the timing (based on the independent expert advice that MTT has received), if Maungaharuru-Tangitū Trust acquires the relevant land (project location) for each of the Marae and papakāinga by December 2024, then the likely timing would be:

- MTT consult its members and finalise design of the Marae and papakäinga by December 2025 (preliminary design work and costings already undertaken but need finalising when actual site/s identified).
- Obtain necessary consents and begin construction of the Marae and papakāinga in 2026.
- Construction completed December 2027.

Resource consent applications for a new Marae on a new site in Tangoio (near the devasted Marae site) were made in late 2022, prior to Cyclone Gabrielle. Those applications have not progressed because that land has now also been classified as Category 3 land by the Crown.

The Maungaharuru-Tangitū Hapū and Marae Trustees as well as the residents of the new papakāinga will need to approve the respective plans for the Marae and papakāinga. Other approvals may be required depending on the new site/s.

As noted above, MTT and its independent advisers have already undertaken significant work on what is necessary for the rebuild of theMarae in terms of design and build and papakāinga, both as part of filing the resource consent applications for the new marae site (which is no longer viable due to the Category 3 classification) and as part of the negotiations with the Crown over compensation arising from that classification of the current and new marae site and the whenua Māori which contains papakāinga.

MTT are currently negotiating with the Crown under the Kaupapa Māori Parallel Pathway in respect of compensation for the classification of whenua Māori as Category 3 land. Once complete, it is anticipated this will provide the funding for the rebuild.

MTT propose that construction commences on the Marae and papakāinga from December 2027 and this will take approximately 18 months.

The relevant Deed of Settlement for the takiwā is that between the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Hapū, the Trustees of the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Trust (MTT) and the Crown dated 25 May 2013. MTT is the relevant post settlement governance entity.
MTT represents the Hapū who hold and exercise rangatiratanga within the takiwā and has done so since before the arrival of the Crown. The Crown and Parliament have recognised the enduring nature of that rangatiratanga through: (a) Article II of Te Tiriti; (b) the Deed of Settlement in which the Crown recognises the MTT Hapū as the tangata whenua of their takiwā, and (c) the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Settlement Act 2014 in which Parliament endorsed and implemented the Deed of Settlement.

An assessment of the known adverse effects of the project on the environment is yet to be completed. Such an assessment will be undertaken once the project locations are determined. However, in terms of the marae, in the Rural Zone these are identified as permitted activities under the Hastings District Council's District Plan Rural Zone Rule RZ14A, but the site must be 'owned or administered by legally appointed trustees or a trust body for the common benefit of a defined group of Māori people'. It may be that once land is acquired it does not meet this ownership requirement at the time relevant consents are sought, but this provision does indicate that marae are generally considered appropriate and will have an acceptable level of effects in the Rural Zone.

Yes. The five councils (including the Hastings District Council and Hawke's Bay Regional Council) along with the post settlement governance entities in Hawke's Bay are members of Matariki – the Hawke's Bay Regional Development Forum that provides regional governance for the recovery of Hawke's Bay from the impacts of Cyclone Gabrielle. They have established the Hawke's Bay Regional Recovery Agency (HBRRA) which is responsible for coordinating planning and prioritisation for the recovery. The Agency has developed, and Matariki has approved, the Cyclone Gabrielle 2023 Te Matau-a-Māui Hawke's Bay Regional Recovery Plan, dated 30 September 2023.

That plan identifies the region's top priorities for recovery at pp 56-57 including:

(a) (at para 9) Work in partnership with iwi/Māori...to help ensure adequate provision of additional housing in the short term and address housing inequities in the medium to longer term. In areas of Hawke's Bay there was a shortage of housing pre-Cyclone that has been exacerbated by Cyclone Gabrielle. Warm, dry, quality housing is a critical requirement for people's wellbeing and providing housing solutions is an important enabler of wider recovery decisions.

(b) (at para 13) Support Māori initiatives and partners to deliver recovery solutions 'by Māori for Māori' including support for communities undertaking the restoration of the mana and mauri of marae....this priority recognises the vital importance of Marae as hubs for community wellbeing (as well as response and recovery)...

The above HBRRA plan references the Takiwā o Maungaharuru-Tangitū Trust Locality Plan, Hawke's Bay Cyclone Gabrielle Recovery April 2023 - https://tangoio.maori.nz/wp-content/uploads/2023/05/MTT\_Locality\_Plan\_version-1.2\_compressed.pdf. That locality plan identifies the rebuild of Marae and papakāinga as two of its top five priorities (at pp 6).

Clause 17 of the Fast-track Bill allows the Ministers to consider a number of matters when deciding if there are significant regional or national benefits from a project. Relevant to this project is that it will 'support... resilience and recovery from natural hazards' as it will:

(a) provide a resilient location that is not classified as unsafe for residential use due to the risk of flooding for both the Marae and papakāinga, (b) aid in recovery from the Cyclone Gabrielle natural hazard as it will ensure displaced whānau can be relocated from areas where there is an unacceptable risk of flooding and risk to life, to warm, safe and dry homes on suitable land within the takiwā,

(c) will aid in recovery from the Cyclone Gabrielle natural hazard as it will re-establish the marae, a key hub for the Maungaharuru-Tangitū Hapū to undertake cultural activities and tikanga. The Hapū are estimated to be in excess of 9,000 members with 6500 members currently registered with MTT.

It will also 'address housing needs' as it will allow whānau to re-establish a home within the takiwā and move out of the temporary emergency accommodation they are currently occupying post Cyclone Gabrielle.

The Marae is also regionally significant because Tangoio Marae was the only Marae of the collective of Hapū that MTT represents and is a central and essential community facility for the Hapū members represented by MTT.

Further, section 6(e) of the RMA suggests that this project could also be a matter of national significance as it provides that matters of national importance include:

"the relationship of Māori and their culture and traditions with their ancestral lands, water, sites, waahi tapu, and other taonga:"

Rebuilding the Marae and papakāinga will provide for the relationship of the Hapū with their ancestral lands, water, sites, waahi tapu and other taonga. This will practically and equitably address 'intergenerational wellbeing' and ensure these relationships are preserved so that the Hapū can continue to practice kaitiakitanga over their land, water and taonga.

The papakāinga project will increase the supply of housing by rebuilding those destroyed by Cyclone Gabrielle, and it will also address housing needs for those who had their homes destroyed by Cyclone Gabrielle and are currently residing in temporary emergency accommodation and will enable Māori to express and practice their cultural traditions. The project will provide rebuilt papakāinga for a minimum of approximately 44 affected residents, from 12 impacted homes.

The project is necessitated by devastation and loss from Cyclone Gabrielle affecting Tangoio Marae and papakāinga at Tangoio, Arapawanui and Te Waiohingānga (Esk Valley). The goal of the project is to rebuild the destroyed Marae and papakāinga in areas within the MTT takiwā which are safer from natural hazards, in particular, flooding. This requires undertaking the project in areas away from current (or previous) sites have been determined as Category 3, being areas most at risk due to the intolerable risk of injury or death and very significant and regular damage to property from future flooding (which cannot be mitigated). This project is a form of managed retreat. MTT and the Hapū have engaged in Dynamic Adaptation Policy Pathways for over a decade to explore adaptation options for Tangoio Marae which was in a well-known flood hazard area.
