Project name	Kings Quarry – Fast Track
General comment – potential benefits	The applicant notes the demand for aggregate to supply the local market which will reduce dependence on more distant sources. This in turn will result in a reduction in bulk transport and associated greenhouse gas emissions. It is also noted that the site is appropriately zoned "Special Purpose – Quarry," and that upgrades to the local roads have been agreed to as part of the resource consent process for the re-opening of the quarry (Stage 1).
General comment – significant issues	Auckland Transport have raised concerns regarding potential effects on the existing road assets, and the safety of the surrounding transport network (refer to their memo dated 6 April 23 appended to Council's response). The Franklin Local Board have also raised concerns about the impact of blasting, dust nuisance, water usage, and damage to the local roads and bridges, as set out in their email dated 6 April 2023 (also attached).
Is Fast-track appropriate?	The Franklin Local Board do not consider the Fast Track process to be appropriate, as set out in their email of 6 April 2023. No other party that Council consulted with raised any specific concerns with this proposal being processed through the Fast Track process.
Environmental compliance history	No enforcement action has been taken within the Auckland Region against Kings Quarry Ltd or its directors, as set out in the email from Maxine van den Berg dated 3 April 2023, attached to Council's response.
Reports and assessments normally required	During the processing of resource consent applications for the re-opening of Kings Quarry (Stage 1), the following specialists reviewed assessments supplied by the applicant: air quality (dust), ecology (terrestrial & aquatic), erosion & sediment control, noise, traffic, geotechnical, development engineering, heritage and groundwater. It is anticipated that at least these same specialist assessments would be submitted for Stage 2.

Iwi and iwi authorities	Comment was sought from the Independent Māori Statutory Board, who noted that comment should be sought from Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara. During the processing of the Stage 1 resource consent applications comment was sought from the following iwi/hapu: Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Whātua, Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara, Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei, Ngāi Tai Ki Tāmaki, Te Kawerau ā Maki, Te Ākitai Waiohua, Ngāti Te Ata Waiohua, Ngāti Maru, Ngāti Manuhiri & Ngāti Wai.

Overall Summary:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comment on the referral of Kings Quarry Stage 2, for consideration under the COVID-19 Recovery (Fast-track Consenting) Act 2020 (Covid 19 Recovery Act).

Auckland Transport (AT) generally supports this application to be accepted as fast-track application. However, certain matters need to be addressed to ensure that there will be no significant adverse effects on AT's assets, as well as the receiving environment.

The lodged files including the transportation memorandum do not discuss in detail the impact of quarry activities on the existing pavement. A Pavement Impact Assessment of Pebble Brook Road is required to identify any upgrade requirements, due to additional traffic loading. Generation of heavy vehicles requires an pavement assessment and pavement design for such quarry traffic movement. Pavement design should include provision of subsoil drainage and drainage reticulation of surface run-off flows.

The applicant should confirm whether the Stage 1 upgrades have been completed and supply a copy of the Road Safety Audit carried out as part of Stage 1.

Transport Assessment

Auckland Transport requests that, should the Project be accepted for fast-track consenting, the requirement for a Transport Assessment is formally stated in the referral order to accompany any resource consent application for the Project lodged with the Environmental Protection Authority.

The main objective of Transport Assessment is to ensure that the transportation effects of a proposal are well-considered, that there is an emphasis on efficiency, safety and accessibility to and from the development. The Transport Assessment should also ensure any adverse transport effects of the development have been effectively avoided, remedied or mitigated. This is reinforced by Policy B3.3.2(5)(f) of the Auckland Regional Policy Statement which requires activities adjacent to transport infrastructure to avoid, remedy or mitigate effects which may compromise the efficient and safe operation of such infrastructure.

Heavy vehicle traffic is likely to have an effect on existing road assets and the safety of the surrounding transport network. This is of critical concern as damage to assets will result in adverse safety effects on the transport network. A Pavement Impact Assessment is required to assess if the existing roads can safely accommodate the construction traffic and also any ongoing access requirements including maintenance of the infrastructure. The Pavement Assessment should include an analysis of the existing condition of the road assets proposed for site access and then assess the effect of the additional pavement loading. The assessment will also need to consider any ongoing maintenance required and reinstatement on completion. This aligns with Policy B3.2.2(8) of the

Auckland Regional Policy Statement to avoid, remedy or mitigate the adverse effects from the construction, operation, maintenance or repair of infrastructure.

Given the transport issues identified, Auckland Transport seeks to be consulted directly should the project be accepted for fast-track consenting to ensure all transport effects can be appropriately considered and mitigated. Auckland Transport requests that any referral order for this project requires the Expert Consenting Panel to include Auckland Transport as a person who must be invited to comment on the project.

Hi Russell,

Thanks for the opportunity to comment from the Franklin Local Board.

To answer specially the questions.

Are there any reasons that you consider it more appropriate for the project, or part of the project, to proceed through existing Resource Management Act 1991 (RMA) consenting processes rather than the processes in the FTCA?

The board believes this application should follow the existing Resource Consent Application process given the immediate community was involved in the last application. It provides the process where further information can be provided publicly and enables mitigation measures to be put forward by the community. Concerns about the impact on blast frequency, dust nuisance , water usage, and other environmental impacts can also be transparently communicated and understood. The roads and bridges leading in and out of Brookby have not been built for heavy haulage and truck numbers are of concern for this community. There is also opportunity to place any offset planting back into local projects already underway which would benefit from further support, such as the Papakura Stream and tributaries to the Wairoa River.

To Whom it May Concern.

Comment from the Rodney Local Board (RLB):

The application for a quarry in Pebble Brook Road, Wainui is not suitable for fast-track processing under the COVID-19 Recovery (Fast-Track Consenting) Act 2020 for the following reasons:

- The Environmental damage it will cause including the removal of 13 streams within the quarry pit and overburden area and the removal of 25Ha of native bush.
- The site is subject to a Significant Ecological Areas ('SEA') overlay and is in an outstanding natural landscape zone/overlay.
- The duration of the proposed activity is excessive i.e., 60 years.
- Nearby residents will be impacted by the dust, noise, and truck movements over a 60-year period.
- There is no right hand turned proposed into Pebble Brook Road to mitigate the impact on traffic.
- The impact of the flood plains and overland flow paths needs to be investigated based on updated data from recent 2023 weather events in Auckland.
