FTC #63: Application for referred project under the COVID-19 Recovery (Fast-track Consenting) Act 2020 – Stage 1 decisions

Key Messages

- We seek your initial decision on an application for referral of the Ministry of Justice Innovative Courthouse project (the Project) to an expert consenting panel (a panel) under the COVID-19 Recovery (Fast-track Consenting) Act 2020 (the FTCA), from the Minister of Justice.
- 2. The Project is located at 27 and 33 McLean Street, and 24, 28, 30 and 32 Monmouth Street, Tauranga, Bay of Plenty (the Project site).
- 3. The Project is for a designation to construct and operate a new Innovative Courthouse in Tauranga. The Project staging (outside the scope of the fast-tracking process) will involve purchasing the land, undertaking detailed design, submitting outline plan, obtaining relevant building consents and resource consents (if required under any regional rules or national environmental standards), commencing physical site works in approximately September 2022 and completing construction by approximately October 2025.
- 4. The applicant intends to lodge a notice of requirement for a designation for the Project. The purpose of the designation will be: "Tauranga Moana Innovative Courthouse Judicial, court, tribunal and related purposes including collection of fines and reparation, administration, support, custodial services, and ancillary activities. Works include development and operation of land and buildings for the aforementioned purposes".
- 5. The Project is part of the Ministry of Justice's Innovative Court Programme. In December 2019 the Justice Minister at the time, Hon Andrew Little, announced Government's investment of \$100 million in a new courthouse in Tauranga, that is to be a model for future courthouse design for New Zealand. Designed in partnership with iwi, the local community, the judiciary, the legal profession, court staff and other court users, it is intended to draw on Te Ao Māori values and directly address victims' safety needs in the court building.
- 6. We have undertaken an initial (Stage 1) analysis of the application and this is presented along with our recommendations in Table A.
- 7. The Project meets all the eligibility criteria in section 18 of the FTCA. More analysis is needed to confirm if the Project meets the purpose of the FTCA and to enable us to advise you on matters in section 23(5) which may influence your referral decision.
- 8. The Project may result in public benefits by generating new employment, contributing to a well-functioning urban environment by promoting active forms of travel, providing a fit for purpose courthouse, providing opportunities to consolidate support services, and contributing to New Zealand's efforts to mitigate climate change through environmentally sustainable design.
- 9. We recommend you progress consideration of the application to the next stage of analysis (Stage 2) and invite comments from:
 - a. Ministers listed in section 21(6) of the FTCA
 - b. Tauranga City Council
 - c. Bay of Plenty Regional Council.

Statutory Framework Summary

- 10. You are the sole decision maker for referral of the Project as it will not occur in the coastal marine area.
- 11. You may decline the referral application before seeking comments from the relevant local authorities and any relevant Ministers:
 - a. if you are satisfied that the Project does not meet referral criteria in section 18 of the FTCA, which include you being satisfied the Project meets the purpose of the FTCA (see sections 18(2) and 23(1) of the FTCA)
 - b. for any other reason (see section 23(2) of the FTCA).
- 12. If you do not decline the referral application at this stage, section 21 of the FTCA:
 - a. requires you to provide the application to, and invite comments from, the relevant local authorities and the relevant Ministers
 - b. permits you to provide the application to and invite comments from any other person.
- 13. You are also able to request further information from the applicants or any relevant local authority at any time before you decide to decline or accept the referral application (see section 22 of the FTCA).

The applicant advises that the notice of requirement (NOR) application will include a social impact assessment that will help inform the design outcomes of the site. The applicant must also provide cultural impact assessment from the relevant iwi authorities with their NOR (or a statement of reasons given by those authorities as to why such assessment is not required).	The applicant considers that the FTCA will allow the Project to progress faster than under standard Resource Management Act (RMA) processes, due to the uncertainties and unpredictability of the standard RMA notification, hearing and appeal process, which can lead to significant time delays for a project of this scale. Obtaining approval for the NOR will give the applicant the security and confidence to continue investing in the development and help to meet their target of moving to the new facility in 2026. We note that the Minister does not require a full AEE and supporting evidence to make a referral decision, and a panel will consider the significance of effects and appropriate mitigation should the Project be referred.	The Project site is located within the City Living Mixed Use Zone of the Operative Tauranga City Plan, which anticipates multi-unit, multi-level residential activities, but with the opportunity for mixed use development, with commercial at the ground floor and residential above. The Project would be assessed as a noncomplying activity if the applicant was to pursue resource consent rather than a NOR. The Project site is also subject to Proposed Plan Change 26 - Housing Choice, that closes to further submissions on 25 June 2021. The applicant advises that the design details for the Project will not be confirmed at the time of lodging a NOR, but that it is intended that the future development will be consistent with the bulk and location expectations for the City Living Zone reflected in Proposed Plan Change 26, which includes provision for six storey apartment buildings in the City Living Zone.	 a.
